



I am delighted to share what we have achieved so far and what we have learned, and reflect on how we can build on this together over the coming year.



# What We Do

The NIHR Health Determinants Research Collaboration (HDRC) helps the council use research and evidence to improve health and wellbeing across the borough.

HDRCs focus on the many factors outside of healthcare that influence people's physical and mental health, known as the wider determinants of health. These include things like air quality, housing, employment, education, transport and community safety. These everyday conditions shape how long and how well we live.

Through our four workstreams, we are improving how research is carried out, how it informs decisions and how findings are shared. This helps us design and deliver better services, tackle inequalities and create healthier communities.

**Capacity and Infrastructure:** Building staff skills, systems and standards to strengthen how we do and use research.

**Culture & Evidence-Informed Practice:** Embedding research and evidence in everyday council decision-making.

**Systems & Partnerships:** Working with universities, the NHS and other partners to share data, ideas and expertise.

**Community Participation:** Involving residents and community groups so research reflects real experiences and local priorities.


### Set the Benchmark

Our first Research Skills & Knowledge Survey, achieving one of the highest national response rates, gave a clear picture of training needs. The findings are shaping a new training programme and the methodology has been recognised by NIHR as best practice.



### Mapped our Strengths

Our dataset mapping interviews that were carried out with council departments identified the data we have and highlighted opportunities for linking data to support needs assessment, evaluation and research.



### Built Strong Governance Foundations

We are setting up a Research Governance Advisory Group and developing new research governance documents to make research across the council more consistent, ethical and locally focused.



# Culture and Evidence-Informed Practice

## Achievements and Impact



### Understood our Culture

We ran an Insights project to establish a research culture baseline at SMBC and launched HDRC intranet pages to support staff in understanding and applying research and evidence in practice.



### Strengthened Equality Focus

We audited Equality Impact Assessment use in Cabinet Reports and are developing a combined Equity, Environment and Health Impact Assessment (EEHIA) tool to support more consistent practice, helping embed continuous evaluation across SMBC.



### Child Friendly Borough Baseline

We collated data on health, social and wellbeing needs of children and young people in Sandwell.

## Achievements and Impact



### Research Prioritisation

We worked with partners, academics and the community to integrate data on the wider determinants of health with community perspectives to identify HDRC research priorities.



### Information Sharing

We gathered and analysed the perspectives of academic partners and Sandwell Council staff to identify barriers to information sharing, forming the basis for our next stage of work.



### Research Strategy

We are working with stakeholders to develop the HDRC Research Strategy, based on our identified priorities, to guide the next phase of the workstream's progress.

# Community Participation

## Achievements and Impact



### Strengthened Engagement

We worked with partners to create a HDRC Sandwell Public and Community Engagement Plan (SPACE) and developed a Communications Plan and Payment Policy to recognise people's contributions.



### Brought Voices to the Board

We codesigned recruitment packs and training with SHAPE Forum and public health work experience students, enabling a community representative and young people to join our HDRC Board to be a voice for Sandwell residents.



### Roadshows Across Sandwell

We delivered 6 roadshow events at community venues across Sandwell, creating opportunities to engage residents and strengthen local partnerships.
