Bostin Places: New bike trails at Sandwell Valley

New bike trails have opened at Sandwell Valley Country Park and the former Hill Top Golf Course in Birmingham.

They are part of the 2022 Commonwealth Games Legacy Project, which enhances the sports legacy for Sandwell, Birmingham and the wider Black Country.

The routes are designed for cyclists of all abilities, the green trail around Swan Pool offering a family-friendly route for beginners. For more experienced cyclists, there are also blue, red or black trails available.

These trails will help Sandwell's residents improve their physical and mental health, as well as their skills, helping them to become more confident cyclists.

They are mainly funded by Sport England's Places to Ride programme, with Sandwell Council and Birmingham City Council providing £100,000 each.

New animal welfare policy at Forge Mill Farm

Sandwell Council recently approved a new animal welfare policy to enable Forge Mill Farm to become a centre of excellence in animal welfare, food and farming education.

This policy will be used by Sandwell Council and Forge Mill Farm staff to deliver high standards of animal welfare. It provides for regular inspection, accreditation and certification from external organisations including a nominated vet practice.

The policy is written for all animals within the management control of Forge Mill Farm across Sandwell Valley Country Park, including Forge Mill Farm, Sandwell Valley Visitor Centre and any other location.

This includes a variety of rare breed animals including sheep, goats, cattle, pigs, alpacas, horses, ponies, donkeys, chickens, ducks and rabbits.

Forge Mill Farm was recently awarded the Whitegrove Trophy by the Staffordshire Country Agricultural Society. The trophy is awarded each year to the farm that shows the best conservation practice alongside a commercial operation within the Staffordshire and West Midlands region.

Elections

Don't forget - at the next elections on Thursday 2 May, you'll need to show photographic ID if you vote at a polling station.

ID OUT OF DATE?

Don't worry if your photographic identification document has expired.

It will still be accepted as long as the photograph is still a good likeness of you.





If you don't have photographic ID, you can apply for a free Voter Authority Certificate.

You must apply for one by 5pm on Wednesday 24 April 2024 and take it with you to prove your identity when you vote at a polling station.

If you already have a Voter Authority Certificate, you can use that. You don't need to apply for a new one as long as the photo still looks like you.



DON'T FORGET! If you apply to get free photo ID to vote in a polling station, you must also be registered to vote.

If the name on your polling card is different to the name on your photo ID (for example, because you have changed your name through marriage or divorce) you may need to provide evidence of this at the polling station.

Being registered to vote will help your credit rating and helps with things like getting a mobile phone contract.

Being registered for Council Tax doesn't automatically register you to vote. You only have to re-register to vote if you change your name or address.



Fill in your nationality, name, address, date of birth and National Insurance number.



The deadline for registering to vote in the May elections is Tuesday 16 April 2024.

HANDING IN POSTAL VOTES IN PERSON?

Changes to the law mean that if you are handing in postal votes at a polling station or at Sandwell Council House, you will have to fill in a form.

You will also **not be able to hand in more than five postal voting packs** from other people (handing in five plus your own postal vote is permitted).

It's important you are aware of this if you are unable to return your postal vote in the post. You must not place postal votes in the postbox at the Council House, as these can no longer be accepted.



VOTING IN 2024

In May, you will be voting in two elections – the local council election and the West Midlands Mayoral election.

Whether you vote by post or at a polling station, you will receive **two ballot papers**. The ballot paper for the council election will be peach (a pale orangey pink), and the ballot paper for the Mayoral election will be yellow.

At present the Police and Crime Commissioner elections are also scheduled to take place. However, an order was laid in Parliament on 7 February for the transfer of powers from the PCC to the Combined Authority Mayor. If this order is made then the PCC election will not take place.

A **General Election** will take place no later than 28 January 2025. If a General Election is called for Thursday 2 May 2024, you will also vote for an MP. The ballot paper for the General Election, if it takes place in May, will be white.

Do check your poll card if you are voting in person to see if your polling station has changed.



CHANGES TO VOTING BY POST AND PROXY

You can now apply online to vote by post and for some types of proxy vote.

The deadline to apply for a postal vote is 5pm on Wednesday 17 April. The deadline to apply for a proxy vote is 5pm on Wednesday 24 April.

You also need to prove your identity when applying, by providing your National Insurance number.

You can only act as a proxy for two people living in the UK and two overseas - four in total. Two must be in the UK. These changes apply to all UK elections. We have two community hubs in Rowley Regis and West Bromwich for when you need to speak to someone face-to-face.

- New Beginnings Community in Smethwick, which provides support for young families as well as wider community services
- Student Voice, run through St Michael's C of E High School in Rowley Regis, which engages young people with mental health initiatives, skills workshops and community outreach projects

Bostin People: Swimming star Karnell makes a splash!

Oldbury sportsman Karnell Nunes-Smith made quite the splash for Sandwell at the Swim England West Midlands Regional Winter Championships, winning two gold medals.

The 19-year-old won in the 16-and-over 50m and 100m Breaststroke events, setting a personal best in both.

The championships were held in Sandwell's very own Aquatics Centre.

Karnell said: "It was great competing at Sandwell Aquatics Centre, as it's my local pool. I can't wait to go back there and compete again!"

In 2023, he also won gold for Team England in the 50m Breaststroke event in Dubai, as well as starting 2024 with a win in the Warwickshire County Swimming Championships where he won the men's open age group 50m and 100m Breaststroke final events

Karnell is supported by Sandwell Council's Gifted and Talented programme, which supports aspiring sportspeople who live in the borough and show promise on a regional, national and international scale.

Bostin Places: Sundial unveiled at Haden Hill

If you head to Haden Hill House and Park in Cradley Heath this spring to explore the estate and enjoy activities, check out the new sundial on Haden Old Hall.

Black Country sculptor Luke Perry used galvanised steel and period detail to keep the sundial similar to the original, which disappeared under mysterious circumstances after a fire in 1977 and has never been found.

The replica sundial was made possible through the fundraising efforts of Friends of Haden Hill Estate, a volunteer community group which supports the historic houses and park.

The sundial looks fantastic and it is a brilliant addition to this heritage building and its stories, but with a modern take.

Haden Hill Park is one of 15 parks and green spaces in Sandwell to receive the prestigious Green Flag Award and is also a Green Heritage Site winner.

HOW YOUR COUNCIL TAX IS SPENT





WHAT YOUR COUNCIL TAX HELPS TO PAY FOR

It's not just bin collections and streetlights. In addition to our leisure centres, libraries, museums, parks and road maintenance, there are many services we provide that you may not know about.

The majority of the Council's budget is for key services that help us to look after and support vulnerable or disabled children and adults. Your Council Tax, along with some specific government grant funding, goes towards funding these important services.

We also assist people with financial problems, help people to find work and run many other projects and services with the aim of supporting Sandwell residents through the cost of living crisis.

Then there are our services that look after our neighbourhoods. From our environmental health and trading standards teams, to the work we do around prosecuting fraud and keeping our streets clean, your Council Tax helps us to run services that will cost around £333million this year.

We're also investing £291million on capital projects and a further £223million in the council's housing stock.

OUR FINANCIAL SITUATION

Sandwell Council isn't in the extreme financial difficulties that some other local authorities across the country have reported.

But we do face significant financial pressures as a result of rising demand for our services at the same time as our costs are going up, which means some difficult decisions have had to be made.

This coming financial year, we've made recurring savings of £12million – savings we'll continue to be able to deliver in coming years – plus further one-off cost reductions of £7million.

And while Council Tax will go up by 2.99% plus a 2% increase specifically for our Adult Social Care service, this increase is in line with the rate by which the vast majority of councils are raising Council Tax.

This will enable us to continue to deliver and improve services, while making savings to balance the books.



Our STAR service (Short Term Assessment and Reablement)

Our STAR service is provided in people's own homes to help them to live independently again. Here's some fantastic feedback from Julie Beard about her mom's experience of using the service following a stay in hospital.

Julie said: "I wanted to say what an outstanding service you provide for people coming out of hospital to help them gain their independence and live in their own homes once again. This recently happened to our family when my mom was hospitalised. We were so impressed by the carers who attended, they were lovely.

"A big shout out to Karen, Tina, Chloe, Chelsey, Sarah (I am sure I've missed someone!) who were always helpful, kind, attentive and kept us in the loop if there were any issues.


Marcus's story "Also, a big thank you to the people on the STAR phone line who were always available to speak with us and keep on top of visits and medication.

Our Specialist Employment Team



The team supports residents with a disability or mental health condition who would like to find a job or return to work.

Marcus, who is deaf, is now working as an apprentice at our supplies warehouse where he's earning a wage while getting a qualification – including his forklift licence.

Marcus said: "The Specialist Employment Team have helped with my CV, they helped with application forms, also setting up meetings and organising interpreters for me. This has really helped with my confidence, having the interpreter in interviews, and the support that has been given has been really valuable.

"My confidence has completely improved and I'm just really enjoying the work."

Marcus's colleagues are now learning BSL using an app and say he's a fantastic and valuable member of the team.

Our Shared Lives scheme

Sandwell Shared Lives supports individuals with a learning disability and a wide range of needs to gain more independence and control over their lives.

We do this by matching them with people willing to share their homes for a few hours, an evening, or weekend, or longer.



Karen started receiving Shared Lives Respite support in January last year. She was matched with a Shared Lives Carer who shared her interests and hobbies.

During her respite, Karen has enjoyed visits to the cinema, shopping trips and arts and craft activities to make birthday gifts.

Since beginning her Shared Lives journey, Karen has become more confident and further developed her independence.



Chrissy is also being supported by Shared Lives and she's started a new job as a cleaner in a school.

Chrissy is in a long-term Shared Lives placement. Helped by her Shared Lives Carer, Julie, Chrissy has now got the job she set out for. She enjoys cleaning and is a valued member of her team, and she goes above and beyond to do a great job.

Our Welfare Rights team

Our Welfare Rights team helps people from all walks of life with benefit claims and debt.

Over the past year, along with the wider Sandwell Advice Providers Network, staff from our Welfare Rights team have helped 39,000 Sandwell people to access £31 million in benefits and payments that they would have otherwise gone without.

They've also advised people on dealing with £20million of problem debt.

Measles is an infection that spreads very easily and can cause serious problems in some people.

Measles cases are rising in England

Make sure your child is up to date with their vaccinations

Measles cases are on the rise in England and across the whole of Europe. Protect yourself and your family from becoming unwell with measles.

You can do this by checking you are up to date with the measles, mumps and rubella (MMR) vaccine.

Two doses of the MMR vaccine gives you and your family lifelong protection. The first vaccine is given at the age of one and the second at the age of 3 years and 4 months.

If you've missed any doses, it's not too late to catch up. Contact your GP practice today to book an appointment to get up to date.

If you are unsure if you or your child are up to date, check your child's red book or GP records. You can then make an appointment to catch up any missed doses.

Check the signs and symptoms of measles by searching 'NHS measles'. Look out for local vaccination clinics at www.blackcountry.icb.nhs.uk

Scarlet fever

Please also be on the lookout for scarlet fever, which is a contagious infection that mostly affects young children.

It can be a serious illness but is easy to treat with antibiotics.



New state-of-the-art medical centre opens in Wednesbury

The Richard Nugent Centre is the new, modern home for the Spires Health Centre. It's also used by members of Sandwell and West Birmingham NHS Trust's District Nurse Service.

Sandwell Council has worked closely with the Spires Health Centre and NHS Black Country Integrated Care Board (ICB) to deliver the new centre.

It includes a suite of consulting, treatment and meeting rooms as well as 32 on-site car parking spaces and an ambulance drop-off centre.

The District Nurse Service uses two new podiatry rooms and four consulting/treatment rooms for a range of services.

The centre is part of a key Sandwell regeneration project on a council-owned brownfield site that has been developed next to Wednesbury Leisure Centre.

The council has invested in the site's infrastructure, which also includes five new council homes, in King Street, as part of its housebuilding programme.

At the request of the ICB, the centre was named after the late Richard Nugent. Richard served as non-executive director of Sandwell and West Birmingham Clinical Commissioning Group until 2018, and was previously chair of the former Sandwell Primary Care Trust, working in healthcare for 35 years.

Construction of the health centre and the new council homes was carried out by Interclass Plc.



Midland Metropolitan University Hospital set to open doors in 2024

In a landmark moment for the community, the Midland Metropolitan University Hospital is set to open in Smethwick this year – delivering healthcare to the people of Sandwell, Ladywood and Perry Barr in an ultra-modern setting.

And at the heart of the Midland Met care model is a commitment to best practice in treating the most seriously ill, ensuring patients who need emergency and urgent care receive a prompt and effective service seven days a week.

Run by Sandwell and West Birmingham NHS Trust, the two existing emergency departments at Sandwell and City Hospitals will combine at the new Grove Lane site to create one new state-of-the-art emergency department.

Among the highlights will be the hospital's comprehensive maternity service. Expectant mothers, due to give birth later this year, will experience care in a midwifery-led birth unit or delivery suite.

Richard Beeken, Chief Executive at Sandwell and West Birmingham NHS Trust, said: "Our maternity facilities at Midland Met are designed to provide a holistic and positive birthing experience. We are dedicated to celebrating the joy of new beginnings and ensuring that every mother receives the highest level of care during this special moment.

"Our new hospital will provide world-class healthcare services in a modern and therapeutic environment."

As Midland Met gets ready to welcome patients, it signals a new era of healthcare and provides a springboard for local career opportunities and regeneration of the local area.

Investing in your parks

Our parks investment programme continues – providing fantastic community spaces that people can enjoy for free to help stay healthy and active.

Work has started extending the allotments at Britannia Park in Rowley Regis, including creating new raised beds.

This is part of the wider improvement project for the park, funded via the Government's Towns Fund programme and Sandwell Council. Coming later this year is a new changing room facility and children's play area.

We've just finished planting 1,000 trees and 300 shrubs on Yew Tree Open Space. This was funded by the West Midlands Combined Authority and Woodland Trust as part of the MOREwoods project.

We planted a new community orchard at Mill Pool, with more than 70 new fruit trees which will bear fruit next season. This is part of the wider Hateley Cross Big Local Project that we're working with to improve green spaces in the Hateley Heath and Stone Cross areas.

A host of play area refurbishment projects have started (or will start shortly) including play areas at Hartlebury Road on Lion Farm, Riddins Mound in Cradley Heath and Denbigh Drive in West Bromwich.

We continue to plan further improvements across Sandwell including improvements to our existing infrastructure.

Introducing Midland Met









Midland Met will bring together all acute and emergency care services currently at City and Sandwell Hospitals.

Our two existing emergency departments will combine to create a new one at Midland Met.

The new hospital will look after people who need emergency care or who are seriously unwell.

Midland Met includes:

- A midwifery-led birth unit, triage, delivery suite, two maternity wards, neonatal unit and antenatal services.
- 13 cutting-edge operating theatres supported by skilled staff dedicated to wellbeing and recovery.
- Over 730 beds with 50 per cent of rooms on wards being en-suite.
- Advanced emergency services with a purpose-built emergency department complemented by co-located imaging and diagnostic services.
- A dedicated children's emergency department with assessment unit.
- The regional hub for sickle cell and thalassaemia care, offering specialised services and expertise.





Findings from the 2023 SHAPE Survey are now available. The results help support council departments and partner agencies to plan their work and design their services around the needs of children and young people.

The top 3 issues affecting young people today as identified from the survey were:

- School work and exams
- Vaping
- · Gangs and youth violence

The survey also covered topics on education, school attendance and youth activities. The main issues young people would solve if they were in charge of Sandwell Council were littering, crime, bullying and mental health and wellbeing.

Thanks to all the children and young people who completed the survey – we value the voices and opinions shared and will work towards addressing needs.

Hamstead Primary will now operate as a 420-place, two-form entry primary school.

Access funding for early learning

Research has shown that children who have good quality early learning experiences make a good start to their education - and it even impacts on their later success.

Going to nursery or pre-school can help your child get ready for school by improving their communication and language skills and making friends.

Families can access government-funded places in Ofsted registered settings including school nurseries, day nurseries, pre-schools and childminders

Funding is being extended to support eligible working parents of two year olds who will be able to access 15 hours of childcare support from 1 April 2024. This will be extended to children from nine months of age from 1 September 2024.

Not at work? You could still be eligible if you or your partner are on maternity, paternity or adoption leave, or if you are unable to work due to caring responsibilities or disability.

Off-road bikes could be seized and crushed

Police and council teams in Sandwell have warned that off-road motorbikes could be seized and crushed if used illegally.

Motorbikes are being seized and CCTV footage used to identify hotspots and track down people who are riding illegally and dangerously, putting themselves and others at risk.

Please report nuisance motorbikes incidents to police either by calling **101**, via Live Chat at **www.west-midlands.police.uk** or anonymously to Crimestoppers on **0800 555 111** or at **www.crimestoppers-uk.org**

You can also report motorbike nuisance online to Sandwell Council. Visit our webpage at **www.sandwell.gov.uk/motorbikenuisance** where you can also read the law relating to off-road motorbikes.

When reporting, please include details such as vehicle registration information and a description of the bike or rider (such as the colour of the bike and clothing).

Did you know?

Off-road bikes must also have the following to be used legally on a public highway:

- A log book and be registered with the DVLA
- Road tax
- A valid MOT
- Be fitted with lights
- Be fitted with registration plates

The riders must also:

- Be aged 17 or over (16 if the vehicle is classified as a moped)
- Hold a valid driving licence
- Have valid motor insurance
- Wear suitable safety equipment (i.e. a helmet)

Off-road bikers must have the permission of the landowner to ride on private land.




Sandwell Police update

Just eight months after my arrival in Sandwell, I'm pleased to say that we're starting to deliver some big service improvements for you.

We're answering more of your calls faster than ever moving us to one of the top performing police forces in the country. We're also arriving at incidents faster, arresting more people, seeing more detections and recruiting more officers.

The overall impact is that crime is starting to fall across the borough as the latest data shows. Crime rates here are now lower than the West Midlands average.



That's why, as members of the Safer Sandwell Partnership, we've increased our work on seizing illegal and dangerously driven off-road bikes. You can read more about this in the article above.

Water safety

Sandwell has lots of open water including lakes, pools, ponds, canals and rivers.

These areas can be particularly inviting during periods of warm weather and people are often tempted to swim in them.

Water may feel warm on the surface but just a few feet below can be icy cold, even in hot weather, and can very quickly cause severe cramp and hypothermia.

Young people can often misjudge their swimming ability.

Due to these dangers, we urge people, particularly children and teenagers, not to swim anywhere other than in purpose-built and supervised swimming pools.



Protecting your home as the nights get lighter

Spring is just around the corner, which means the days are getting warmer and the nights are becoming lighter – but don't let your guard down when it comes to securing your property.

West Midlands Police is working hard to proactively deter and target thieves, but everybody has their part to play to prevent themselves from becoming a victim of burglary.

- Make sure to close and lock your doors and windows when you go out, even if you are just in the garden, and check doors and windows before going to bed.
- Don't leave valuables or keys where they can be seen or reached through the letterbox and open windows.
- Install security lighting and/or CCTV cameras around your property.
- · Lock up all side gates, sheds and garages.

Still time to have your say on HMOs consultation

Sandwell Council is currently holding a consultation on a licensing scheme for landlords of houses of multiple occupation (HMOs) borough-wide.

An HMO is when at least three tenants live in a home, forming more than one household and they share toilet, bathroom or kitchen facilities with other tenants.

The consultation is looking to improve the management and living conditions for tenants living in this type of property and to reduce crime and anti-social behaviour problems.

The additional licensing scheme would mean that landlords of any house in multiple occupation not covered by mandatory licensing would need to obtain a licence.

Your views are wanted on the plans which would affect around 3,500 houses in Sandwell.

Local business buys defibrillator and bleed kit for commun A Tipton family business has bought a defibrillator and bleed kit for the

Ramesh Sahota and his family have run Five Ways Newsagents in Dudley Road for 44 years, including serving the community through Covid-19 lockdowns for people to get their essential shopping.

The family decided to buy a defibrillator and bleed kit as the shop is located on a very busy junction and they have seen their fair share of incidents and near-misses.

The bleed kit can be used in a major blood loss incident to prevent further blood loss. The items in the kit can potentially buy the injured person additional time before the emergency services

Mr Sahota said: "The emergency services are all under pressure, so if the defibrillator or bleed kit provide an extra window of opportunity and time to allow the emergency services to get to the casualty, we thought this was a valuable investment not only for the shop, but also for the local community.

"The defibrillator is also child friendly so if it is ever needed for a child, people know where to come.

"I would urge other businesses to follow our lead and to invest in a defibrillator and bleed kit as they could one day save someone's life."

REGENERATING SANDW

Sandwell is growing. A total of 78 projects across our six towns are transforming our borough, attracting a potential £2.9billion of public and private sector investment over five years.

The aim is to improve the quality of life for everyone, create more well-paid, fulfilling jobs and make Sandwell a healthier, wealthier, greener place to live and

Our regeneration journey is well under way – on pages 14-15 of the Herald read about major new health developments including the Midland Metropolitan University Hospital in Smethwick and the Richard Nugent Centre in Wednesbury.

We also feature the official opening of the new Shireland CBSO Academy in West Bromwich (page 17), which supports young musicians, and the opportunities offered by the new Sandwell Start-Up Hub in Oldbury (page 20), which helps aspiring entrepreneurs and new businesses.

Over in Rowley Regis, we're continuing work with the Canal & River Trust to make canal towpaths more accessible to more people, while improvements are also gathering pace at Britannia Park (page 14). We secured money from the Government's Towns Fund to support these two projects.

In other Towns Fund-backed projects, a Digital Den in West Bromwich developed with Greets Green Community Enterprises has enrolled nearly 500 learners onto varied courses since its launch in 2022. Learners have gone on to jobs ranging from healthcare to accountancy.

At the Ron Davis Centre in Smethwick, a new IT suite is helping Sandwell Adult and Family Learning Service to provide a range of English, Maths and Digital Skills

Meanwhile, restoration work has started at West Bromwich Town Hall and projects to improve cycling and walking routes in Smethwick and West Bromwich are continuing.

egeneration schemes in Tipton and Wednesbury

Sandwell Council is working with the Government on wide-ranging regeneration projects for Tipton and Wednesbury.



We're planning to build around 65 new council homes in Tipton town centre after securing £20million from the Government's Levelling Up Fund.

Three sites along Union Street – under-used or vacant flats and shops – will be redeveloped to provide high-quality, energy-efficient, one and two bed apartments, to be let by the council at affordable rents.

The scheme will also:

- Improve the canal walkway between Union Street and Elliott's Road, making it safer and easier to use, with new trees planted
- Give a facelift to shops along Owen Street
- Resurface pavements and upgrade lighting
- Create higher-quality public spaces
- Improve safety in Owen Street and Union Street

In January, we held a drop-in consultation session in the town, with display boards to explain and illustrate the proposals, which people could also view and comment on

More than 200 responses were received, which will help guide the next steps. Demolition is planned to begin later in 2024, with construction to start in 2025 and completion in 2026.



In Wednesbury, the council and Government have a £20.4million Levelling Up Partnership (LÚP).

Six projects are being funded.

The projects are:

- Wednesbury Town Centre making it greener with new trees and planting, and creating long-term plans to tackle derelict sites and keep the town thriving
- Friar Park Urban Village preparing the land at Friar Park Urban Village ready to build 630 new homes
- Community Safety helping partners tackle crime and anti-social behaviour with new and improved CCTV, engaging with residents and businesses, and making changes in green spaces to discourage nuisance motorbikes
- Green Spaces improving green spaces at Hydes Road Playing Fields, Balls Hill Open Space, Wyntor Lane Open Space, Lakeside and Norbury Road Open Space
- Millennium Centre expanding the Friar Park Millennium Centre to accommodate a wider range of services helping people to improve skills and access better jobs

The council has set up a partnership board to oversee the LUP. This brings together a range of representatives including councillors, MPs, statutory bodies, business leaders, voluntary sector representatives and young people.

We're warning residents of the dangers of batteries and electrical items going into bins.

The move follows a spate of fires in the back of refuse and recycling vehicles, and at waste facilities across the country due to batteries being disposed of in household bins.

As well as traditional batteries, many everyday household items including laptops, mobile phones, electric toys, e-cigarettes, Bluetooth devices, shavers, electric toothbrushes and power bank chargers contain hidden batteries. This can make them hard to notice or separate out.

Lithium-ion batteries in particular, which carry the highest risk of combustion, have become increasingly popular in recent years.

Residents are urged to be responsible and dispose of batteries correctly either at their nearest recycling point, at the kerbside if they're separated out into a clear bag or at the tip (Household Recycling Centre) in Oldbury.
