This includes preventing anti-social behaviour by increasing the number of CCTV cameras in our towns. I want us to continue to have some of the best roads in the country, free of potholes. I want us to keep focusing on creating the best green spaces which improve everyone's quality of life.

### **Nuisance bikes seized and crushed!**

As part of #SaferStreetsSummer, a nationwide initiative in towns and high streets across the UK, West Midlands Police and Sandwell Council have been clamping down on anti-social behaviour in Sandwell.

One of our priorities was targeting illegal motorbikes and other off-road vehicles, as we received increased reports of this activity during the summer months.

Thanks to your information, we identified hotspots and held various operations where bikes were seized.

These bikes were then crushed as they had been driven in a dangerous manner. If you are caught riding an off-road bike illegally, we will seize and destroy it.

We have also focused on retail crime, which led to a number of prolific thieves being charged and jailed for their persistent shop theft.

Some offenders have also been given criminal behaviour orders which can ban them from specific locations in town centres.



## The King officially opens Midland Met Hospital

His Majesty King Charles has officially opened the Midland Metropolitan University Hospital in Smethwick.

The King unveiled a plaque at the new hospital in September, interacting with flag-waving crowds who were delighted to see him visiting.

He was greeted by Sandwell and West Birmingham NHS Trust's Chair Sir David Nicholson and Chief Executive Diane Wake. The Mayor of Sandwell Councillor Steve Melia and Sandwell Council Chief Executive Shokat Lal also attended the visit. The King was then taken to meet patients and staff on an older person's care ward.

Eighty-five-year-old Jackie, from Great Barr, said: "He was brought into my room and shook hands with my husband first and then he shook hands with me. He held my hand most of the time I was talking to him, so it was a lovely experience."

During his tour, King Charles also met with frontline doctors and nurses, as well as support staff, volunteers and the parents of the first baby born at the hospital.

## Fly-tippers face £1,000 fine

Since January 2024, we have issued 54 fines for incidents of fly-tipping, littering and where residents gave their waste to someone who failed to dispose of it properly.

And, if people choose not to pay the fine, we are taking them to court – where they will be prosecuted and may receive an even higher fine or potentially imprisonment.

Our waste management partner Serco helps us get fly-tipping swiftly removed from council land. We're using CCTV more and more to tackle fly-tipping and other antisocial behaviour.

We urge everyone to take responsibility for their waste. You can help us too:

Use the tip in Shidas Lane, Oldbury, where you can dispose of unwanted items for free. **Go to www.sandwell.gov.uk/tip** to book a slot.

Use our bulky waste collection service for large household items. Go to **www.sandwell.gov.uk/bulkywaste** to book.

If someone offers to take away rubbish, check they have a waste carrier's licence, get a receipt and note the details of any vehicle used. If fly-tipped waste is linked to a resident, they may be held liable for a fine of £600 under Householders' Duty of Care.

### **Keeping our roads safe this winter**

We're ready for any cold weather that comes our way. Our gritting crew will be on 24-hour standby from mid-November, ready to keep Sandwell moving in snow or icy conditions, night and day.

- Every time the gritters go out, they cover around 260 miles of Sandwell's roads, each time putting down around 55 tonnes of salt.
- · Not only are we ready for winter gritting, we're also leading the way in maintaining roads and tackling potholes.
- The percentage of residents satisfied with road maintenance in Sandwell (72%) is more than double the local government benchmark (27%).
- And another survey recently put Sandwell in the top three local authorities nationally for the way we deal with potholes.
- We're spending £15million this financial year to keep on top of these priority highways issues for residents and other road users.
- We're responsible for maintaining nearly 550 miles of roads across our six towns. So, while we can't stop them all, we are winning the battle with potholes.

Proud veterans, councillors, council staff and members of the public attended the service outside Sandwell Council House to mark the anniversary of the end of the Second World War.

Thank you to the hundreds of people who attended, and a big thank you to the Oldbury and Blackheath Royal British Legion branches for organising the VJ Day parade.

The Mayor of Sandwell Councillor Steve Melia said: "While many celebrated VE Day (Victory in Europe Day), fewer people are aware of the hardships faced in Asia and the Pacific. This 80th anniversary of VJ Day (Victory over Japan Day, which followed the dropping of the first atomic bombs), provided a moment to remember, reflect and recognise those who served far from home.

During the service, Councillor Keith Allcock and council employee Ghulam Ditta shared stories of family members who fought for Britain in the jungles of Burma, where many people from different faiths and backgrounds served together to help secure a better world.

## **Investing in Sandwell's parks**

You have told us how much you value parks and green spaces in Sandwell and, because we're a council that cares and gets things done, we're investing in making our open spaces places that everyone can enjoy.

Our borough is full of wonderful green places, like our much-loved Sandwell Valley Country Park, and we're proud of our Green Flag parks and open spaces.

Our green spaces mean different things to different people. But whether you enjoy them because they feel like an openair community centre or gym, a garden where you can chill out or somewhere to meet your friends, we want to make sure they're safe, welcoming and pleasant places for everyone.

Last year we invested £3.8million in parks, play areas, outdoor sports facilities, nature reserves and other green spaces, including £1.2m improving Britannia Park. This year we're spending a further £4.3m on 50 projects across 40 of our parks.

We're a sporty borough with 48 outdoor sports sites, including 15 playing pitches, 27 multi-use games areas, 33 outdoor gyms, four bowling greens and 12 BMX and skate facilities.

We've got 40 allotment sites, with 1,336 plots lovingly tended by residents who benefit from the many health benefits of being in the open air, being part of a community and growing their own produce.

We're building our first new park for 50 years at Brandhall, we've put extra money in this year's budget for tree maintenance and we're helping biodiversity through tree planting and rewilding schemes.

Our hard work has been recognised through the Green Flag Awards, an international scheme recognising well-managed parks and open spaces. We've got 16 in Sandwell – a park in each of our six towns, two cemeteries and a crematorium, as well as Sandwell Valley Country Park and communityrun spaces.

We can't do this on our own friends' groups and community volunteers have helped make our green spaces among the best in the country. Together with our investment and hard-working parks staff, we've created places that are special for everyone who lives here.





## **Peace Gardens** plan for six Sandwell parks

Sandwell is set to mark 80 years since the end of the Second World War by planting 80 native trees across six local parks - one in each town - creating new Peace Gardens and Woodlands that will stand as living memorials for generations to come.

Each space will offer quiet places for reflection and togetherness. The project celebrates the resilience of Sandwell's communities while honouring the sacrifices of those who served in the Second World War and the peace and freedom won 80 years ago.

The Peace Gardens and Woodlands will pay tribute to servicemen with strong ties to Sandwell and ensure

of countless others, continue to inspire future generations. Schools, community organisations and heritage partners are supporting the project, with further tree planting events planned across our six towns



- Many of the park's historical elements have been brought back to life, including the drinking fountains, the 19th century bandstand and the Shakespeare Garden plus new paths and a play area.

## **Sandwell Police update**

**Chief Superintendent** Kim Madill, Sandwell Police commander, gives an update on policing and partnership work.

It's been a busy few months since my last update.

Aside from the operations we've been running to reduce crime in the area, including Operation Advance as it returned to the borough in September, we have been working hard to find and prosecute the men who raped a young woman in Oldbury on Tuesday 9 September.

That investigation continues and we have made progress. You can stay updated by following our 'Sandwell Police' Facebook page or by signing up at www.wmow.co.uk to receive free email updates from us.

The Crimestoppers charity is offering a huge reward of up to £20,000 for information which leads to the arrest and conviction of those responsible. If you can help, please call Crimestoppers now on **0800 555 111** – they will not trace your call or ask for your name.

I recently hosted a meeting to talk about women's safety with community and faith groups, charities, councillors and MPs, as well as our independent advisory groups.

This work will continue to ensure concerns are addressed through police and partnership activity. There will be an intense focus during the 16 Days of Activism against gender-based violence that starts on 25 November. I hope you feel able to get involved on this important issue.

Hate crime remains a priority for us at Sandwell Police. Please keep reporting

If you do not want to report hate crimes directly to the police, you can contact a third-party reporting centre. These are venues such as libraries, community organisations and places of worship where staff have been trained to take formal reports of your concerns. You can find details on the council's website.

No one should live in fear of being followed, watched or harassed. Stalking destroys lives - but support is here in Sandwell and across the West Midlands.

#### What stalking can look like:

Stalking is persistent, unwanted attention that makes you feel harassed or threatened. It may include:

- Repeated calls, texts or messages
- Sending unwanted gifts or notes
- Turning up uninvited at your home, work or other places
- Damaging property
- Using social media, fake profiles or tracking apps to monitor you

The West Midlands Stalking Support Service offers free, confidential support for anyone aged 16+.

Specialist advisers provide safety planning, evidence-gathering tips and guidance on reporting to police.

Victims are urged to trust their instincts, keep records and call 999 if in danger.

## Community safety progress in Wednesbury

A community safety project in Wednesbury is already delivering strong results, with significant reductions in crime and anti-social behaviour across the town centre.



Funded by the government's Levelling Up Partnership, upgrades have included:

- 26 new or upgraded CCTV cameras
- 8 deployable cameras for crime hotspots
- 11 locations fitted with equipment to deter nuisance off-road bikes
- a new business partnership and radio scheme in the town centre to support ongoing safety efforts

The impact goes beyond just new equipment – the project and partnership work between the council, police, businesses and partner organisations has delivered real change on the ground:

- reduction in shoplifting
- drop in drug-related offences
- reduction in public order offences
- fewer nuisance off-road bike reports

The project has also:

- improved detection and responses to crime and anti-social behaviour
- helped strengthen intelligence sharing between businesses and enforcement teams
- encouraged people to report incidents in the town centre, helping us to target local issues more effectively

Deputy Council Leader Councillor Suzanne Hartwell said: "We listened to people's concerns and acted. These results show what can be achieved when the council, police, businesses and residents work together. We want Wednesbury to be a place where people feel safe and proud."

## **Operation Advance success**

More than 20 people were arrested, vehicles were seized and drugs were recovered as part of Operation Advance last month.

Policing teams in Sandwell were supported by extra force resources and worked closely with partner organisations, including Sandwell Council, to carry out targeted activity.

The day saw an early morning drugs raid, a multi-agency road safety operation, an off-road bike operation, arrests, proactive vehicle patrols and a knife arch.

An estimated £20,000 to £30,000 of illegal vapes and tobacco products were seized during a partnership operation with the council's Trading Standards team at three shops in Cradley Heath. Around 10,000 cigarettes and 4,000 vapes were found.


Illegal vapes and cigarettes can pose a health risk, and their sale can seed criminality in our communities.

As part of a multi-agency road safety operation held in Oldbury, around 28 traffic offices were identified, seven vehicles were seized, and arrests were made.

It was not just about enforcement, as the operation also saw school talks, engagement with communities and gathering intelligence.

Operation Advance allows police and partners to carry out intensive activity and build on work which is going on every day of the year to make Sandwell a great place to live and work.





West Midlands Police is stepping up efforts to keep your community safe this season.

We often see a seasonal rise in burglary and car crime through the autumn and winter months. So, as the nights grow darker, police are increasing patrols in key areas, acting on information from the public, and working closely with partner organisations to prevent crime and protect residents.

- Heading out? Make sure your home and vehicle are secure by locking all windows, doors and side gates.
- Check you have removed valuables from your vehicle, locked it and securely stored your keys.
- Planning a gathering? Keep side entrances, garden doors and porches locked to deter opportunistic thieves who
  may target unattended valuables or car keys.

## Free School Meal holiday food vouchers coming in December

Sandwell Council is continuing to support families of more than 23,000 children with vouchers during school holidays.

The vouchers – worth £130 per child over the year – are for pupils who get benefits-related Free School Meals.

Eligible families will receive a £40 voucher in December to cover October half-term (backdated) and the Christmas and February half-term holidays.

This is in addition to £90 vouchers which were issued earlier this year in July.

The vouchers are part of a £6million package of help funded through the Household Support Fund this financial year.

This funding is also being used to support Local Welfare Provision to help people in crisis – more low-income families are now eligible to apply, including residents who need help with disability equipment including wheelchairs.

The money is also being used to support local food banks and food pantries, carers and young people leaving care, budgeting and benefit advice through the council's Welfare Rights team, and help for residents with rent arrears and Council Tax bills.

## Don't misuse a Blue Badge! We're cracking down on Blue Badge fraud.

Misuse of Blue Badges makes it more difficult for people with disabilities and mobility issues to find a parking space.

That's why we've prosecuted 25 people for Blue Badge fraud over the past year – which has also seen us and our parking partner APCOA shortlisted for a British Parking Award.

### Have your say — take part in our budget consultation



Every year, the council is legally required to set a balanced budget. We're now looking at what money we have available to spend next year.

As a council, this year we set a total budget of around £1.3billion. Some services, such as schools, council housing, planning and car parking, receive specific income from grants or from charging fees direct to service users. That income adds up to £906million.

This gives us a budget of £366million to deliver our day-to-day services for the 342,000 people who live in Sandwell. This is called our "net budget".

Here's how our net budget of £366million for council services is funded:

Council Tax: 40%

Business Rates: 56%

Non-specific Government grants: 4%







**Sandwell Council's Deputy Leader Councillor Paul Moore said:** "It has been important to us to protect your services and to make sure that we look after your money. We had to make some hard decisions last year on things like bin collections. "This has enabled us to focus this year on things that will make our borough cleaner and safer.

"Our proposals will deliver some of the best roads in the country with our approach to removing potholes.

"We will tackle anti-social behaviour with more CCTV and enforcement. Residents will see even more investment in our parks and green spaces.

"Our capital programme will see investment in our town centres, more affordable housing and delivering on our masterplans to bring new life to our six towns. "We also want to keep your Council Tax as one of the lowest in the region. The decisions we make when setting our budget will show that we are a caring council that gets things done."

"Working with such well-regarded local partners means carers can access trusted support in their own community."



### **Transformation begins at Haden Hill Leisure Centre**

Cradley Heath is set to welcome a state-of-the-art leisure facility as work begins on the £24million redevelopment of Haden Hill Leisure Centre.

Bulldozers will roll onto the Barrs Road site this October marking the start of demolition of the existing centre.

Construction of the new facility is scheduled to begin in January 2026, with doors expected to open to the public by spring 2027.

The new centre promises to be a major boost for health and wellbeing in the region, offering:

- A main swimming pool and learner pool A 27-station indoor cycling studio
- Two multi-purpose studios
- · A 100-station gym

- A four-court sports hall
- A dedicated community room

The ambitious project is being funded through a partnership between the UK Government, Sport England and Sandwell Council. Alliance Leisure is managing delivery of the project.

Construction firm Speller Metcalfe has been appointed to carry out the build, bringing their expertise to a development that aims to serve residents for generations to come.

Sandwell Council says the new centre will not only modernise the local leisure offer but also create a vibrant hub for community activities and fitness.

## Stay well this winter

As winter approaches, now is the time to think about protecting yourself from the misery of flu. Sandwell and West **Birmingham NHS Trust A&E matron Michael** Brennan has some advice to help you through this winter.

He explained: "Flu spreads more easily in winter when we spend more time together indoors and it can cause serious illness. It is important to get protected, even if you have had a vaccine or been ill with flu before, as immunity fades over time and these viruses change each year. If you are vaccinated and catch flu this winter, you are likely to have milder symptoms and recover faster, cutting your risk of being hospitalised. Flu often peaks over the festive and New Year period, and nobody wants to miss out on the festive celebrations with their friends and family, so my advice is winter vaccines provide the best possible protection."

If you are offered a vaccine for flu or COVID-19 please come forward. You can book an appointment via the National Booking System. Appointments are also available on the NHS App or by calling 119. Calls to 119 are free from mobiles and landlines and the booking service provides support in 200 different languages. BSL users can use textphone 18001 or the NHS 119 British Sign Language (BSL) interpreter service.

Michael continued: "Please do not come to A&E with flu unless you have underlying conditions and are severely affected. Flu is easily passed from person to person, so you may pass it on to vulnerable people by attending a health care setting. Flu symptoms hit you suddenly and sometimes severely. They usually include fever, chills, headaches and aching muscles, and you can often get a cough and sore throat at the same time. Flu is caused by viruses and not bacteria, so antibiotics won't treat it. People sometimes think a bad cold is flu, but having flu can be much worse than a cold and you may need to stay in bed for a few days if you have flu. Paracetamol and ibuprofen will help manage the symptoms until you recover, but please check the dosage and do not combine different medicines.

"To help protect the NHS this winter. Please choose healthcare services wisely. We often see a rise in the number of people needing medical care in winter, and we want to provide the best service we can for every patient. If you need urgent help but it's not an emergency, visit NHS 111 online or call 111 for clinical advice, assessment and signposting to the right service. The NHS App can help with this. If you haven't already got it please download and start using it. Please see details below."

## Blackheath businesses open as usual

Businesses are open as usual as work nears completion on the new Blackheath Bus Interchange, public space and safety improvements.

The town centre and Blackheath Market are open and accessible and temporary traffic plans are in place to minimise disruption.

Work is due to finish in the coming weeks. We thank businesses, residents and shoppers for their patience and understanding during this £2.9million regeneration project, which is funded through the government's Towns Fund programme.



### **New homes for Friar Park**

A combination of sites is set to deliver more than 700 much-needed new homes in the Friar Park area of Wednesbury.

Sandwell Council and West Midlands Combined Authority (WMCA) recently appointed Keepmoat as the developer to drive forward 600 new homes at the Friar Park Urban Village site.

The scheme, a joint project between the council and WMCA, is part-funded by the government's Levelling Up Partnership. The project will see around 600 homes built on the huge site, approximately the size of 32 football pitches. At least 25% of the homes will be classed affordable.

Keepmoat said: "At Keepmoat, we're committed to transforming lives and creating a thriving new community in Wednesbury. This is an exciting project to deliver much-needed, high-quality housing for local people."

The first phase of work on Friar Park Urban Village will be to treat the land to address historic contamination issues, so that it can be made ready for housebuilding. The council and WMCA will shortly submit a planning application for this remediation work, and people will be able to have their say on the proposals.

This development adds to work already under way on separate housebuilding projects in Friar Park by Persimmon Homes and Keon.

## Help shape the Sandwell Design Code

The Design Code is a planning document, required by government, that guides design standards for the way sites or areas are developed.

The Sandwell Design Code team has undertaken a successful round of engagement with people across the borough over the summer and early autumn.

This has included pop-up activities at West Bromwich outdoor market, the SHAPE Youth Festival, Blackheath Library and a series of community fun days.

The Design Code website is now live and includes snapshots of some of the mapping analysis, local character appreciation and headlines from people's feedback so far.

Everyone is invited to take a look, have your say on local issues and help identify the priorities for the design of new development in Sandwell.

## **Update on Tipton regeneration**

Sandwell Council has appointed Torsion Construction Ltd to build 55 new affordable council homes in Union Street, Tipton. Following a period of detailed design work, construction has started on site.

Torsion has a strong national reputation for delivering high-quality private sector housing, and this scheme marks their first-ever public sector housing project – a real success for Sandwell and for people in Tipton.

Work starting on site represents a major milestone for the project, which will set a new benchmark for the quality and sustainability of affordable apartments in Sandwell.

Alongside this, and following planning approval in May, the council is now working to appoint a construction partner to refurbish and extend the former Conservative Club, also on Union Street. This scheme will provide a further 15 new homes while giving a much-loved locally listed heritage building a new lease of life.

This regeneration project, which is supported by £20milion of government funding, also includes improvements along Owen Street and to public spaces in the town.



## **Next steps for Brandhall Village**

As part of the Brandhall Village project in Oldbury, the old clubhouse in Heron Road will be demolished in the coming months.

At the same time, plans for a new public ecopark have taken a major step forward – Sandwell's first new public park in 50 years.

Following community consultation, we have created a final masterplan for the ecopark, focusing on preserving natural habitats, increasing biodiversity and offering green space for the whole community to enjoy.

This ecopark will include upgraded walking trails, native planting and areas for relaxation and education.

The council has also started the process to bring forward proposals for a new, replacement school for Causeway Green Primary and new housing on other parts of the site – visit the Brandhall webpage www.sandwell.gov.uk/brandhall for more information on this and the ecopark masterplan.

Site survey work and ground investigations will also be taking place in the coming months.





## New West Brom indoor market is now open for business!

Sandwell Council Leader Councillor Kerrie Carmichael and Blind Dave Heeley OBE launched the new West Bromwich indoor market with a plaque dedicated to the occasion.


The new market is located on High Street and replaces the old indoor market in Kings Square.

This is one of the centrepieces

of Sandwell Council's West Bromwich Masterplan, created to deliver a modern and vibrant destination for both traders and shoppers. Combining traditional market stalls with contemporary facilities, the market also features specialist street food in the new food court.

### During the opening two weeks, 77,627 people visited the new market!

The market includes the return of Firkins Bakery, plus a butcher, fishmonger, Caribbean food supplies, beauty services, cosmetics and perfume, curtains, mobile phone repairs, as well as clothes, haberdashery and pet food supplies.



The project is a great example of collaboration thanks to £2.61 million funding from the government's Towns Fund programme, which is supporting regeneration and investment in towns across the country, and £2.03m funding from Sandwell Council.

The new indoor market is open 9am to 5pm Monday to Saturday, while the food court is open 11am to 5pm Monday to Thursday and 11am to 7pm on Fridays and Saturdays.






## Centenary celebrations for Chapmans

## Safety checks – your safety is our priority

The safety of our council tenants is one of our top priorities. It is our duty as your landlord to ensure that you can live safely in your home.

We complete a rolling programme of risk assessments to ensure that your property is safe to live in. We've been visiting properties to perform safety checks and inspections and can report that, as of 31 July this year:

- 99.6% of all gas safety checks have been completed.
- 98.3% of electrical safety checks have been completed.
- 100% of buildings with communal areas have had a fire risk assessment.
- 100% of buildings with a communal water supply have had a legionella risk
- 100% of buildings with communal lifts have had a lift safety check.

100% of asbestos reports have been completed to communal areas of blocks that require a survey.

We are also carrying out inspections and tests on the installed smoke detectors in our properties. This may be part of the normal gas and electrical servicing and testing programmes or be part of a bespoke programme for all electric properties.



## Homeless or worried about losing your home?

The earlier you get in touch, the more we can do to help and prevent you losing your home.

It is more important than ever to contact us as soon as possible. The demand for homelessness support has increased from around 4,000 households in 2021,



that are either homeless or at risk of homelessness in the past year.

Demand for council housing has also increased significantly with over 23,000 households now looking for council housing.

More than a third of people who needed assistance in the past year to prevent or relieve their homelessness were supported with an offer of a private rented property, as the demand for accommodation means an offer of a private rented property is much more likely than an offer of council accommodation. The council aims to increase this to two thirds of all cases by the end of 2026.


