The more waste we create, the worse it can be for the environment.

To create a cleaner Sandwell we can make small changes by

1

Reduce and prevent waste

Buy less, avoid using packaging and creating waste



2

Reuse and repair

Give things a second life by repairing and reusing items



3

Recycle

Reduce the raw materials we use by recycling items to prevent them from going to waste



4

Recover

Items are sent for incineration, although this creates energy items only have one use



5

Landfill

The last resort, extremely damaging to the environment

What goes in

- Food tins and drink cans
- Glass bottles and jars
- Plastic bottles, tubs and food trays
- Empty aerosols
- Foil

FOOD WASTE BIN



What goes in

- Meat and fish/shellfish – raw and cooked, including bones and shells
- Egg products (including eggshells)
- Dairy
- Bread, cakes and other baked goods
- Pasta and rice
- Beans and pulses
- Fruit and vegetables (including peelings)
- Tea bags and coffee grounds
- Lard and other hard fats
- Wet and dry pet food
- Any meal leftovers

- Packaging
- Cardboard
- Foil
- Plastic film
- Glass

- Straw or other animal bedding

GARDEN WASTE (GREEN) BIN



What goes in

- Grass cuttings
- Hedge and shrub clippings
- Plants and weeds
- Leaves, twigs and bark
- Cut flowers
- Windfalls (fallen fruit such as apples)



REMEMBER You can compost your garden and food waste at home

NON-RECYCLING (GREY) BIN



What goes in

- Nappies
- Clothes or fabrics
- Wrappers from crisps, biscuits or sweets
- Hard plastics like coat hangers or toys
- Black bags
- Polystyrene
- Wipes





REDUCE




Avoid overbuying food

Borrow instead of buying




Buy pre-loved and reduce fast fashion purchases

REUSE



Use reusable bags

Reuse wrapping paper and gift bags



Upcycle your furniture

RECYCLE



Flatten cardboard before disposing in your recycling (blue) bag



Batteries must be recycled separately in a plastic bag on top of your recycling (blue lid) bin



Thin plastics such as crisp packets, bread bags and cling film can be recycled at most supermarkets



Separate items properly



Garden and food waste can be composted at home



Recycle plastic plant pots at garden centres

IMPORTANT CHANGES IN LAWS

The government has introduced new laws to improve recycling, reduce waste and protect the environment. Sandwell's recycling and waste collection service has been designed to comply with these laws.

All households have to recycle the same materials and separate paper and card from glass, cans and plastics. This ensures that paper and card is better quality and easier to recycle. Councils in England must also provide a separate food waste collection.

From 2028, new rules mean that if we don't reduce our non-recyclable waste, we'll face higher incineration costs. That's why it's so important to separate your waste properly.

Only items that can't be recycled should go in your non-recycling (grey) bin. If you're not sure which items to put in each bin/bag please look over the page.

We are not able to collect bins/bags if they contain incorrect items.

Got extra recycling?

You can request more than one recycling (blue) bag or a larger recycling (blue lid) bin per household. You can also take items to the tip for recycling.

Additional support

If you are producing excess waste and are struggling to cope you may be eligible for additional support.

Assisted collections

If you have a disability, mobility problems or other reason you can't put your own bins out, we may be able to help you. If you already receive assisted collections, please don't worry these will continue.
